#### "Older" Dogs Deserve A Second Look



No doubt, ours is an age conscious society in which younger often translates to more desirable. Just ask anyone over 40 who is searching for a new job or considering a few nips and tucks in order to create a more youthful image on the dating circuit. It comes as no surprise that most people apply the same ageism when they select a

dog. Puppies are most popular, followed by dogs under two. Sadly, chances for adoption decrease sharply as the animals age, and some of the best potential friends don't get a second glance from perspective owners.

Since Botox is not an option for our canine friends past the "popular age," the burden falls on those of us who volunteer at shelters like Oasis to speak up for them. To that end, a list of compelling reasons to look beyond the young pups when choosing a pet follows (in no particular order):

- 1. Yes, you CAN teach an old dog new tricks. The secret is to use different commands than those the dog ignores according to dog trainer Kathy Santo, who frequently appears on *The Martha Stewart Show*. If the dog doesn't respond to *come*, for example, try *here*, or substitute *let's go* for *heel*. Use a foreign language if you prefer. With patience, consistency and a little know-how gleaned from training books or classes, owners can teach older dogs everything from new name recognition to proper walking and bathroom etiquette.
- 2. What you see is what you get in the case of the older dog. A young dog has yet to develop his personality. Knowing a dog's personality upfront helps an owner judge how he'll fit in to a household. Shelter adoption counselors can help people make good matches with adult, developed dogs.
- 3. With the current unsteady economy, more and more people are leaving long-time pets at shelters because of financial difficulties. These abandoned dogs, often very well mannered, wait for new forever families to love. Dogs who are victims of neglect and unrealistic expectations wait, too. Giving any one of these unlucky animals a second chance is a noble act and a feel-good experience.
- 4. The prospects of chewed up shoes, nipped fingers, and interrupted sleep caused by whining decrease with the age of the adoptee. In short, calmness usually accompanies maturity.

Please help us spread the word: Perfect pets come in all sizes, shapes and **ages**. The staff at Oasis would love to find homes for *all* our canine residents including the adult and senior dogs pictured at left and far right.

#### Happy Endings: Ebony's Story

Ebony is a friendly black, mixed breed dog, perhaps a bit too large to call medium-sized. Her endearing warm, low

maintenance personality, loved by the volunteers who cared for her, did not stand out to most people who visited the shelter. Though she was approaching middle age in dog years, Ebony was still quite playful and affectionate, but most visitors wanted younger dogs and didn't give her a second look. Ebony's friends began to fear she might never find her forever family.



But as the headline suggests, this story has a happy ending. Pat gave Ebony that second look and knew she

found her forever family. Upon hearing the news, staff members were ecstatic. The Oasis volunteers celebrate every adoption, but those involving dogs like Ebony really pull at the heart strings.


While Pat faced challenges with Ebony because of her lengthy shelter stay, she believes any adoption has some hurdles. She and Ebony bonded almost instantly, and Ebony's devotion and desire to please Pat have been instrumental in her adjustment.

"Sometimes she seems fearful of something I want her to do, and I can almost see her thinking, 'I don't want to do this but for you I will,' " said Pat. "If I sit on the floor, she comes over and literally 'melts' into me."

Ebony and her canine sibling Snickers have become friends and interact well. Ebony also loves Pat's children and grandchildren. Pat is happy she brought such a caring dog into her home. "There will always be some challenges, but there are with any animal," admits this adoptive parent. "I don't think anyone should be scared off if a dog has been in a shelter for a long time. Give it a try — you might be glad you did."
