in the cyberworld of pet-centered web sights, Mike Sagman's "Dog Food Advisor" is well worth a bookmark. Sagman, a Doctor of Dental Surgery with a background in chemistry was moved by personal tragedy to learn everything he could about the dog food industry. The self-proclaimed "dog food geek" shares his findings in a series of articles, unique in style and content, with hopes of "saving good dogs from bad dog food." Categories include canine nutrition, choosing dog food, dog food industry exposed and red flag ingredients. He also

provides a "dog food calculator" to help owners determine proper serving size. Because overweight dogs suffer a higher rate of lifeshortening diseases like diabetes and cancer, portion control is especially important. Speaking of red flags, all the grisly choices in the test question above may be included in America's dog food legally and listed as "by-products, "middlings" or "tail-of-the-mill" according to Sagman. 









