

Oasis Receives Grant

Typically, when dogs come to Oasis, they visit the vet for a checkup, heartworm and fecal tests, and immunizations including DHLP, bordetella and rabies.

Now, thanks to a grant



made possible by PetFinder and Intervet/ Schering-Plough Animal Health, the dogs will also receive Canine Influenza vaccine. The first round was administered to all dogs at the shelter last month. Oasis is grateful to the sponsors of this grant for providing us with yet another way to keep our friends who wait for homes healthy.
